Centre of Excellence for Emergency Worker Mental Health to Raise the Bar



The nature of emergency service work means that staff and volunteers are more likely to suffer mental health conditions through exposure to trauma. This often leads people to seek the help of a mental health clinician. Sadly, many of those who have sought help report that finding the 'right' clinician is difficult and that turns them away from treatment, so their health continues to suffer.

Recognising a need for improvement was the impetus for creating a uniquely Victorian Centre of Excellence in Emergency Worker Mental Health. Led by Phoenix Australia and funded by the State Government, the Centre will build the capability of Victorian health professionals to support emergency service workers by:

- Building the awareness and capability of practitioners to meet the needs of emergency workers whose mental health has been impacted by their work.
- Developing a Specialist Network of Clinicians in emergency worker mental health.
- Designing, delivering, and coordinating research and evaluation projects that aim to identify and embed innovative evidence-based mental health treatments.

ESFs most recent Insight conversation discussed why the new Centre is so important with Professor David Forbes from Phoenix, Dr Tony McHugh a practising trauma related therapist, and current serving VicPol detective, Andrew Lawrence. A recording of the conversation is <u>available here</u>.

Dr Tony McHugh drew on his extensive experience working with people in the sector to say what has applied until now is not good enough. "This is a once in a generation opportunity to get our approach to treatment right for emergency service workers."
