TACKLING THE BIG ISSUE



To kick of ESF's Mental Health Showcase we hosted a gathering of executives from across the sector to meet with WorkSafe's Chair John Merritt and CEO Colin Radford.

They presented a picture in metrics which made absolutely clear the human, operational, societal, and financial cost of mental injury.

- At February 2022, 24% of all mental injury claims were from emergency services employers compared to 15.67% in February 2022.
- Emergency s experienced +44% growth in overall claims over the past year.
- PTSD accounts for 36% of claims for emergency services.
- The majority relate to other factors such as workload, interpersonal conflict, and bullying.

According to John It is not so much the jobs we do - the emergency is closer to home and the hazard is other people. The sector was urged to plan and respond to the mental injury crisis in the same way we are accustomed to dealing with disasters.

A reported one third of psychologists left the industry last year so he said, 'Help is not on the way!' Research has found that mental health claimants had poorer return to work experiences and were less likely to return to work a year after their injury. Both factors can be linked with negative supervisor responses.

He said, 'We want people who lead people to think their number one job is caring for people.' Pleasingly, this is the essence of ESFs Leading for Better Mental Health program to develop team leaders.

With that in mind and knowing that the time between injury and seeking treatment is critical to recovery he asked the executive leaders to consider how they can harness the power of their leadership individually and collectively to win this battle and GENCY make a real and meaningful difference to many thousands of people.
